Our CDLA Tractor Trailer Drivers are expected to act in a professional, courteous manner and are required to obey all traffic laws.

In this position, you will be assigned any one of the daily routes and may periodically be required to stay overnight in a hotel due to DOT hours of service restrictions. In this position you will report to the Trucking Supervisor. All drivers who operate commercial motor vehicles that require a commercial driver's license under 49 CFR 383 are subject to the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's (FMCSA) drug and alcohol regulations, 49 CFR Part 382. As a result, you will be subject to random drug and alcohol testing. Regardless of the route(s) you are originally assigned, our goal is to give you the training needed to cover any of the routes we currently run. Cross training is a fundamental core value at BROSCO and your willingness to strive for comprehensive knowledge of this position is essential.

Qualifications / Requirements of the CDL Class A Driver

- Minimum 3 years driving experience
- High school diploma or General Education Degree (GED), or one year of related work experience and/or training; or an equivalent combination of education and experience.
- Possess a valid CDLA.
- Demonstrated ability to read and interpret documents such as work orders and written instructions.
- Demonstrated ability to add, subtract, multiply, and divide all units of measure, using whole numbers, common fractions, and decimals.
- Have reliable means of transportation to and from the workplace.
